Changes to Pathway for General Developmental Assessment



Background

The community paediatrics pathway is the route for children and young people to be assessed for autism, ADHD and non-global developmental delay via a **General Developmental Assessment (GDA).** Previously all referrals for this pathway came from:

- General Practice
- Healthy Families Team (School Nurses / Health Visitors)

However, this is changing to make the pathway work better for our children and young people.

Why is it changing?

To help professionals work better together to provide children with the support they need. The Special Educational Needs and Disability Code of Practice (2015) recommends that schools support children with additional needs through an 'assess, plan, do and review' graduated response. The new process for a GDA reflects this and makes sure that children will get on-going support whilst they wait for an assessment.

What has changed?

The big change is that early years services and schools will lead on the request for assessment, not GPs. This is because they will have more information about children, information that clinicians need to be able to make a good assessment. Early years services and schools will be supported by practitioners from the health families Team.

If a child is not in an early years setting or is being educated at home, the Healthy Families practitioner will lead on submitting a request for assessment.


What to do if early years and/or schools won't put in a request?

We encourage parents/carers to have another conversation with the early years or school setting as they will have lots of information on the child, information that clinicians need to be able to make a good assessment. However if parents/carers continue to feel they are not being given the support needed then they should contact the Healthy Families Team on **01777 274422**.

Red flags

Any child presenting with "red flag" signs/behaviours, such as developmental regression (losing previously acquired skills), significantly delayed in achieving early developmental milestones (social smile, sitting, walking, speech and language), suspected vacant episodes/seizures etc. should be referred by the GP to Community Paediatrics/Paediatric Neurologist promptly.
